

When are elections I could work?

2015-2016 elections are scheduled for:

Saturday, Oct. 24	\$200
Saturday, Nov. 21	\$200
Saturday, March 5	\$200
Saturday, April 2	\$200
Tuesday, Nov. 8	\$200
Saturday, Dec. 10	\$200

Do I have to work every election?

No. About three weeks prior to an election in your domicile precinct, we will mail you a letter. Follow the instructions in the letter to let us know if you are available to work the election.

Where do I work?

You work in your domicile precinct or in any precinct of the ward where you live.

How do I certify?

As a U.S. citizen and St. Tammany registered voter, you must attend a 5-hour certification class and pass an open book test. About a week later, we will send your certification status by mail.

What would I have to do for \$200?

First: For a candidate election cycle, you need to attend a pre-election class (1.5 - 2 hrs. long) that will cover the details of that election cycle.

Second: Elections held on **Saturday**, work at the precinct 6:30 a.m. **sharp** until approximately 8:30 p.m.; elections held on a **Tuesday**, work at the precinct 5:30 a.m. **sharp** until approximately 8:30 p.m. You must stay until the last voter votes and everything required to close down the precinct is done.

Do I get paid for certification and pre-election classes?

No. However, by attending the required classes, you will earn \$200 on election day; otherwise, you earn only \$100 for working an election.



When are classes?

There are three classes scheduled in 2015:

Covington

Friday, Aug. 14, 2015

10 a.m. until approx. 3 p.m.

Slidell

Monday, Aug. 17, 2015

6 p.m. until approx. 10 p.m.

Mandeville

Wednesday, Aug. 26, 2015

6 p.m. until approx. 10 p.m.
